David is a graduate of Union Theological Seminary (Masters of Divinity) and Columbia University (Masters of Human Rights). CPBC in Action Refugee Update

It was a bright Saturday. Rain had been forecast, but there wasn't a cloud in sight! Fifty potted plants, fifty brooms, bearing flowered stickers proclaiming "With Love from the Islamic Center of the Triad and College Park Baptist Church" were ready to go. May Zamamiri, the Refugee Coordinator from the Islamic Center of the Triad (ICT), and her many volunteers were unloading plastic tubs full of clothes (men's, women's, children, and category called "Pakistani clothes"....which were silky and embroidered and very elegant). This was the "Share the Love" event at 3100 Summit Avenue on April 22.

This apartment complex at the intersection of Summit and Cone Avenues is often the first home for refugees that come to Greensboro from Syria, the Congo, Tanzania, Sudan, and many other places. College Parkers and volunteers from the ICT teamed up to share the love with flowers, clothing, household goods, and a general cleanup. College Park provided the flowers, household donations, and plenty of strong backs and willing hands to give the refugee families a cleaner environment and some new items to grace their homes. Though there are 3 dumpsters that serve the complex, our College Park volunteers collected over 50 trash bags full of overflow trash, yard waste, and trash scraps. Thank goodness we had a volunteer (Mark) with a truck that could haul away what wouldn't fit in the dumpsters!

We met new friends in the complex as ladies and children came out to help with the raking. We don't expect that this improvement will be permanent, but we did brighten the lives of the people we met and we were greatly blessed in return!

We started working with May Zamamiri and the ICT volunteers as CPBC and the ICT worked together to help the Hjazi family after the baby, Nomo, was attacked by the dog on February 14. The baby continues to improve and except for the scars on his little face and his missing **ear, he is just as rowdy and charming as ever. We don't** have a date for the next surgery yet.

Ibrahim and Amani have both gotten their learners permits and are starting lessons to learn to drive. The Islamic Center of the Triad is going to find them a car that will be big enough to hold all of them. The generous contributions to CPBC for the Hjazi's benefit will provide support for an Arabic speaking young woman to translate for them at their medical appointments, provide transportation to medical appointments, and assist them in learning how to track and pay their monthly bills. The money donated thru the Church related Go Fund Me account is being put into a trust for educational and medical expenses for the 5 children. The other Go Fund Me account will be managed by the Islamic Center of the Triad on behalf of the family. Due to the publicity surrounding the family, some Arabic speaking faculty from Elon University and the Holy Comforter Episcopal Church in Burlington have provided additional funds to

move the family to a larger apartment and subsidize their rent for six months. This will give the family more space and reduce hazards from the steep stairs. The **Hjazi's moved last week and their new address is 123D** Yester Oaks Way East, Greensboro, NC 27215. College Park is currently working with African Family Services Coalition to find another refugee family for the Summit Ave apartment.

Before last December I was aware of refugee issues and knew there were many refugee families in Greensboro; but I had no idea of the challenges they faced or the challenges that arise from trying to help them. I have been greatly blessed through this work. I have met many people, both at College Park and in the greater community, whose generosity is unbelievable. I have met our wonderful refugee families; the Hiazi's as well as Mamoun, Raveen and Mohammad. Charlie and I have traveled to Atlanta and met amazing people in the Syrian Care Network who are creating entire supportive communities to help refugees with their transition to the challenging life of the U.S. I have had the distinct honor to become friends with May Zamamiri, who is truly an Islamic Saint, if there is any such thing. May works with 60 refugee families through the ICT and carries a car full of odds and ends so that no immediate need can go unmet.

I have substantially expanded my connections with my **College Park family....and sincerely thank each and every** one of you for the time, interest, labor, support, and love that you have given to all of the refugees that we have touched so far. There are many more opportunities to help. The next is moving Mahmoun and Raveen to their new house on April 29. (Stephanie Kretz and Karlan Barker are leading this effort.)

Keep your eyes open for more opportunities to join this wonderful outreach to our new neighbors!

Failure Imagined

Get Up! Go See!

When I moved to Greensboro for graduate school, I lived with a young couple on Walker Ave. He too was a writer. He was also a drinker, and when he got drunk, he turned into a sullen, violent bully. The man had **major demons. He'd brought his deer rifle to grad** school.

Late one night he came home and blasted his stereo. I shouted for him to turn it down, but he didn't hear me or wasn't in a mind to. Eventually I got out of bed and went into the room with the stereo. He wasn't around. I ripped the needle off the album. It made that horrible noise. I went back to bed. He burst into my bedroom incensed. I sat up, still angry at him but now surprised and terrified too. He was going to pound me senseless. I don't know why he didn't.

Maybe because they needed my money to make the rent. Maybe because the album was mine. All he did was leave me with a threat. *"If I ever...."* This set the stage for the epic failure that shames me to this day.

One morning weeks after the stereo incident, I heard his girlfriend pleading for him to stop. She sounded truly afraid. They were in their bedroom. There was scuffling. Was he still drunk from the night before?

Get up! Go see! You, with your experience working in mental health. Just appearing at their bedroom door, asking, "Everything OK?" might be enough. But I lay there, paralyzed with fear. Where was the pissed-off Mark who'd gotten up to silence the damn stereo? Her sporadic cries, the commotion lasted a minute or two or three maybe. Then quiet. I still didn't get out of bed.

I avoided them for days, though I might've seen her wearing sunglasses. I don't remember for sure because if she had worn them, I suspect I tried to erase it from my memory. I moved out at the end of the semester.

They got married and in a few years moved away. This was long before my faith awakening at College Park, so God didn't cross my mind then. I know now I'm loved and no act nor absence of an act is beyond forgiveness, but the gut-twisting memory of what a coward I was, how I could've stopped an act of domestic violence and didn't, remains and likely always will. I *am* a coward. I've had opportunities since to earn a little redemption, and I failed those as well.

It hasn't changed me, but I keep moving—not much good in a crisis, better at the grind, I suppose. It's how I live with myself.

Which is where God factors in.

Troop 02485/8th Grade Cadettes

This troop of nine girls has just wrapped up their Silver Award Project this spring, which is one of Girl Scouts' Highest Awards (Bronze, Silver, Gold) and requires 50 hours per girl to complete. Working in teams, these girls devoted the past year to working with children at Partnership Village (PV), which is an Urban Ministry housing community with supportive services for families (and men and women) getting resettled after experiencing homelessness. The girls organized a drive to collect duffel bags and needed items to send PV children to summer camp last summer. Then they developed a "Healthy Snacks" program, complete with cooking classes and a cookbook, teaching the children how to make a number of different healthy snacks on their own. They had some adventures this past year, including a treetop adventure at Skywild, camping at Keyauwee Girl Scout Camp, and sleepovers at the church. They have loved cooking and serving meals to the church members (especially using the new kitchen!!)! Thank you for all your tremendous support! Their next adventure? They will "bridge" to become Senior Scouts this summer, and are saving money for a "big" trip in two years.

Troop 02483/5th Grade Juniors

In our fourth year of scouts, these 11 girls have grown and learned to work together. They are working on their Bronze Award this spring, which is the highest award for Junior Scouts. Each girl must contribute 20 hours toward a troop project. This group has chosen to dedicate their energies to helping our imperiled pollinators by creating a pollinator garden at Lindley Elementary School, where most of the girls are students. They will plant bee-friendly species and create an educational program for students at the school. This year, they have learned wilderness skills at Camp Keyauwee, learned how our local government works, earned some badges, and are headed to Great Wolf Lodge later in May to celebrate a great year. They will bridge to become Cadette Scouts this summer and look forward to more fun times together next year.




