Mission Trip Reflections



These trips have affected me very much and I spend much of the next year if not years reflecting on them. One thing I've learned is that when you're not focused on yourself and getting pleasure, joy creeps up and surprises you unexpectedly.

This year we arrived and pulled up to this house that looked like a meth lab house in the middle of nowhere. I wasn't sure of what to expect from this trip, I knew it would be blazing hot and work wouldn't be easy but we had been prepped not to think of the trip in terms of personal pleasure and that made a difference. Our first day at VBS I felt a little anxious. I wasn't sure how I was going to communicate with kids who only knew Spanish. I was in charge of the games. As soon as we got there Keith and I were shocked. If you could close your eyes and imagine a house that you wouldn't want your kids to be in, that was the house. I led the games in the back yard. The backyard was covered in dog poop and nails and broken glass. None of that mattered eventually though. Like I said, joy crept in and it was just you and the kids. Seeing how hungry they were for just a little of your attention was crazy. It didn't take any words to be filled with God's spirit. Who knew a little kid pulling at your hair could make your day? The first day was hot, crowded and a little chaotic. But the next few days were truly touching and spiritually moving. You bonded with kids and watched them laugh and learn about God.

These trips are suppose to be about helping other people - or so I thought, but they ended up helping me. Every evening of the mission trip Lin ends the day by asking "where have you seen God today?" This is always key for me and all throughout my week I think about it. I saw God several times at my mission site, but honestly I think I saw God the most outside of my formal duties. Just watching us youth interact and care for each other. We are a family and sometimes just being surrounded by the people who care and love you while worshiping God is moving enough to bring tears to my eyes. I'm not normally an emotional person (sort of like my dad) but in that environment everyone is so raw and vulnerable and I found myself crying because of the happiness I felt. Talking about God isn't really a common or cool thing in our time of day but seeing a variety of people in different stages of development feel comfortable enough to speak about God and their relationship with God was amazing. You don't get something like this anywhere else. Like I said earlier, I constantly think about these trips. I think

about the late night talks I had on the roof with Maggie, playing soccer with the Laredo youth group, blasting Miley Cyrus in the car with Adam, bonding with the younger freshman girls, or playing Pokemon Go. I especially think of this one night I drew away from the group and just walked around and talked to God for hours surrounded by the beautiful desert.

Another thing I've learned from these trips is you are encouraged to step outside your comfort zone. This is something that is hard for me but I've learned to address a variety of major challenges in different spheres. I don't know if you have ever been to Laredo, Texas, but it sort of feels like a different world. You're forced to emerse yourself in a different culture, but I learned that our connections as Christians span geography. This stretched me and helped me realize just how different other cultures are. Each have their own unique blessings and challenges different from my own. The challenges of Laredo blew me away, the poverty is in your face from the minute you get there. Mangy dogs roamed freely and the children seemed poorly dressed and often quite hungry. But the strengths and blessings of the culture slowly emerged for me. For example, the Hispanic people struck me as so vibrant and emotional, free and expressive. In one worship service, during song time I literally just stopped singing and closed my eyes and enjoyed listening to this one women behind me who was singing loudly and with such obvious passion sometimes even raising her arms and closing her eyes. She was really into it. This was another God moment for me.

The land of Texas itself has its own look and beauty. The last night we celebrated the completion of the pizza oven with a big communal party with the Laredo church. That evening I remember just walking around soaking in the beautiful setting sun and vast horizon with new friends. The people themselves sometimes showed this remarkable inner strength that showed itself in their hardships. For instance, this one Mexican woman had been volunteering her humble home all week for vbs. She hosted the kids who were dropped off by their parents each day. In the last hour she asked for prayer and my group circled around her. She shocked me when through a translator she explained "look I need prayer because sometimes parents drop their kids off and don't pick them up for days. Leaving me with long term child care and mouths to feed. But I just pray for patience and love to use this opportunity to share God's love and not think about the cost to me." She went on to apologize that she had nothing to give us, the youth group, but she asked for the grace to get through what she was doing. I stood dumbfounded at her generous spirit and lack of resentment. I came in thinking we were the haves of a have-not world but I was challenged by her amazingly Christian attitude, so much better then my own. These trips have caused my faith to grow and stretch in so many ways. They certainly have changed me and I'm thankful for this church for helping to make them happen. I'm also thankful to Lin for her awesome planning and leadership and for making these trips really meaningful.

What I hadn't realized until that moment was that not only had I hopefully changed their lives, but they had changed mine. I will always remember seeing them laugh and giggle at the simplest of things and hoping that I somehow made as much of an impact on their lives as they had made on mine.



KITCHEN MAKEOVER BEGINS

Hooray! The long-awaited kitchen time-warp from 1950s to 2016 is set for takeoff! Demolition began September 19. Hopefully, the renovation will be completed by mid December.

While the current kitchen has stayed busy with weekly youth dinners, Wednesday night dinners, cooking for Greensboro Urban Ministry and many other events, it has many limitations and is worn out! Due to the extensive needs, the kitchen team took the leap of faith for a complete rebuild to serve the next seven decades.

The first phase of kitchen upgrades was made when the elevator was installed—including adding the beverage center with icemaker, tea and coffee makers, along with enlarging the doorway and serving windows. A new freezer was also purchased so we could buy more in bulk.

The estimate for this capital campaign project is \$205,000. Why so much? Of that, about 75% goes toward demolition and construction. The most expensive pieces are the waterproofing, electrical and plumbing —totaling \$50,000. Other big ticket items include the complex range exhaust system with fire suppression, dedicated HVAC, flooring and ceiling. The remainder covers commercial equipment including a Hobart dishwasher, on-demand hot water, stainless steel shelves, dish carts (reduce paper plate waste) and work tables.

KITCHEN FYI

- The Fellowship Hall will be accessible during construction, including the hallway by the elevator.
- Youth meetings will continue at the church on Sunday nights
- We will still be cooking for Greensboro Urban Ministry during the kitchen renovation. We'll be




- Write a check or give cash at one of our Sunday services or at the office during the week. If you don't have envelopes with an assigned number (for better record keeping), contact the church office.

- Pay online with a credit card at: <u>www.CollegeParkChurch.com</u>. Choose the option to cover the credit card fees or let the church pay them.









Fall Bible Study with Lia Scholl Wednesday Nights, 6:30 pm Oct. 5 & 12 In Forest Chapel




