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Servant Leadership Award Mike Ferris

Some of you, especially newer members, may not know who Mike Ferris is. And you shouldn't feel bad about that, because Mike intentionally keeps a low profile. He is not one to seek out the spotlight, but instead prefers to quietly perform "off-stage." So let me give you a little history about the fellow we honor today.

Mike was born in Winston-Salem in 1954, and shortly thereafter moved to Greensboro. In fact, Mike just had a birthday the day-before-yesterday, turning 63 years of age.

Mike was raised in Greensboro, where he graduated from Grimsley High School. He subsequently put in several years of study at UNCG.

In 1974, Mike was approached by his church baseball coach about coming to work for the coach's Service-Master franchise. Over the next 12 years, Mike learned the flooring maintenance business as a part of the ServiceMaster team.

1986 was a banner year for Mike. First, he left Service-Master and started his own company, which he owns to this day.

In that same year, he married Wendy, who he had met through her work at a local bank. Mike & Wendy were **married in College Park's chapel. Being a flooring** professional, Mike was enamored not only by his bride but by the blue shag carpet in the Chapel back then!

Mike also joined College Park in 1986. Almost every Sunday morning since then, you can find Mike seated about halfway back on the left side of the sanctuary.

It wasn't long before Lee Stocks, who was the Chairman of Building and Grounds back in 1986, corralled Mike into joining the committee. He has been a member ever since.

Over the next several years, Mike began to learn all about the intricacies of this old building. Mike feels that he got the best possible church building education from **Dan Cottrell, one of the "old-timey wise men" on Building** & Grounds.

Pretty soon, if it could be walked on around here, Mike owned it. He brought his professional knowledge and equipment to our facility many, many times over the next 30 years. He handled the fire restoration in the vestibule some years back, and has pumped out countless gallons of flood water.

He knows how to clean and maintain every type of flooring that we have, and has been instrumental in getting the most longevity from our floors. There is no telling how much money Mike has saved us over the years.

Mike got involved in other Building & Grounds efforts, also. He has been a welcome addition to many other projects around here, and is usually the first to arrive and the last to leave the job site. His insight and suggestions have kept many projects headed in a successful direction.

In keeping with his reserved nature, Mike also quietly assists others outside the church. There are a whole host of folks who Mike voluntarily helps out on a routine basis, performing handyman tasks and cutting grass.

Indeed, about the only time Mike gets loud is once a year at the Daytona 500 in February. Almost every year for many decades, Mike and some of his friends make the **pilgrimage to the "birthplace of speed" to spend a week** letting-**off a year's worth of energy.**

Mike has been blessed with a fine family, good health, and a successful career. We, in turn, have been blessed by his continuing presence among us. It is our honor to today recognize Mike Ferris as a recipient of the Servant Leadership Award.

Servant Leadership Award Cindy Dillon

I loved hearing Cindy Dillon was chosen to receive the Senior Leadership Award this year, and count it a privilege to be asked to explain her connection to it. You see, we go back a long way.

Michael and I came to CP in 1994, and she found her way right on our heels, in '95. In fact, she visited, on a Sunday I myself gave a focus, which included me sharing some struggles I'd gone through with my father, who was a strong personality. I shared vulnerably about those struggles, and Cindy much later shared that my testimonial had been instrumental in her choosing to make this place her home. She later told me, "You and Michael were so open and real-I couldn't believe that one could be that vulnerable in a Baptist church since I'd grown up in one-and then when I learned that it was the pastor's WIFE who had shared!-I was really taken aback, and decided this was a place I could camp out in. That maybe people COULD be real and honest with one another--even in church, which is what I knew should be the case." It warmed my heart to learn that Cindy had felt a kinship with us from the start, and was committed to church truly being church, a place of genuine community, even with all the occasional discomfort and messiness that entails.

And she has been a committed member, a real trooper, though the next *two decades plus* in helping make this place an authentic church community that tries to be healthy and real and loving. She has left a deep imprint on CP, and her philosophy is so in sync with ours that we knit ourselves together with a chemistry that never felt forced.

Within a few years of her arrival, by 1997, Cindy became Sunday School director, an area she's had a natural passion for, and was always looking for ways to get a bead on what people needed to grow in discipleship—difficult in an era when fewer people feel the pull to that. She was creative and served several years in that capacity. She also served faithfully on Building and Grounds for 3 years. By 2000, she joined the Meet and Greet Team, interested in helping new members find ways to connect. Also by 2000, she became a deacon, serving for the 3 years term, then taking a required year off, then serving again for another 3-year stint. Oh, and did I mention that she served as Deacon Chair in 2006, halfway through that second stint? During her last year as a deacon, while she didn't remain Deacon Chair, she made up for that by also taking on a commitment to the Missions Committee, so by her second year on the Missions Committee, as soon as she had cycled off her Deacon commitment, she agreed to chair the Missions Committee.

This woman thrives on building up the church. And she knows she is gifted in this unglamorous work that is equal parts administrating, connecting, researching, negotiating, and preparing. As she tells it, she felt a calling to church ministry, and struggled long and hard with how best to fulfill that before God. For the time being, she knew that pouring herself into College Park wherever the needs regularly presented themselves were one expression resulting from that calling.

Her passion for Sunday School also found an additional avenue in the early 2000s when she agreed to take over teaching the Pathfinders class. She taught that mostly with other co-teachers, like Mike Kirkman, for over 10 years, until 2013. She then went on to co-lead the Faithseekers class as well for another two years. On top of all that, she was a committed choir member from her arrival in 1996 to 2013, as well as a faithful handbell ringer!

By 2007, she was a staple of CP's hardworking circle of committed church-people, and Michael conferred with her often. She felt a natural burden and interest in all things church related. It was during that intense period of service that she confessed to Michael that she'd felt a lifelong and continued strong call to ministry. It had reared its head much earlier in her young adulthood, and again as a middle-aged adult. She had never quite figured out a way to swing seminary logistically, and labored over that continued pull. Michael listened and prayed about it with her. He encouraged her to go, and she seriously considered it, drawn especially to the seminary in Atlanta. However, she took seriously her commitment to her mother, who has a complicated life, and Cindy didn't see a clear path to guitting work, paying for it all, and continuing to fulfill her family roles.

Michael then offered her a creative solution. She'd proven herself a selfless minister right in our midst, and he said he felt sure the church would welcome her taking it to a new level, also right in our midst. He asked her to consider an actual position on our church staff, part-time, so she could continue in her full-time job-but with more worship leadership, in a volunteer capacityallowing her to try on this new role. What was win-win is that Cindy was about to embark on a new, stretching role usually reserved for the seminary trained, and CP would be the clear beneficiary in getting a tried and true church worker to bump UP her commitments without the traditional remuneration. Knowing Cindy, no one will be surprised to know that she felt reserved and unsure at first. Michael said recently that Cindy's only problem has ever been self-confidence. She's certainly more than competent and organized; she has great common sense, a compassionate heart for people, a superb work ethic, and a genuine compulsion to give to God in service of the church. She just won't naturally suggest herself.

Part of what makes her such an effective minister is that, for Cindy, it is never about *her*--getting glory, adulation, or focus. In fact, those things are off-putting **to her. But if she can be convinced that it's about the** *ministry* **needing to get done, then she's all over it. She once explained, "Once I think of anything as church** work, I just roll up my sleeves and can be quite assertive, with no self-confidence problems. I can talk to or with just about anybody, in front of a group or one-on-one. As

long as I don't think of situations as 'public speaking' or 'leading a group,' I'm just fine and take all kinds of initiative without any self-consciousness at all."

We've all experienced Cindy in that comfortable mode. It seems so natural now for her. What is cool is thinking about how her taking that approach into the pulpit did not appear seamless to her or to some of us at first, except in retrospect. Starting in 2006, the church approved Michael's recommendation, and welcomed Cindy into that new role as Minister of Small Groups. She joined the matrix of ministers meeting weekly for planning of church worship, with an eye toward not just weekly flow of worship, but also the *monthly* and *yearly* church calendar, and agreed to try out increasing hats both within worship and without. Sometimes you'll remember Cindy led announcements at the beginning of worship, sometimes she played the role of liturgist, reading scripture and praying. A beloved role that she owned over time was leading our weekly time of confession, when we wove that element into worship. Many felt her calm, warm voice walking us through our dark places and quilt--into the soothing assurance that God's love and acceptance of us gets the final word—somehow felt like such a perfect fit when Cindy did it.

She even preached several times, shocking people with how natural and gifted she was. She admits she found it quite stressful to prepare for, but exhilarating because of the positive feedback, and she learned that she really did have something to say. It was moving for her to learn of her giftedness; more areas than she'd originally even hoped for were finding expression and edifying her church family. She grew to be comfortable even in her most public roles. I have to shake myself to remember the super-reserved, uptight, and stiff Cindy that first showed up at CP decades ago! That Cindy has flowered over the last two decades—and become so comfortable in her own body, so eminently sure of herself, so calm and steady and pleasant. She still tends to be guieter, but she laughs often and extends warmly to all kinds of people, remembering details about individuals and then following up with them. She has become such a gem—or maybe we all just can finally see it now because of the polish she has developed through long exposure and hard work.

And what you all saw Sundays or Wednesdays was only a fraction of the ways she played out that role at CP that she took on. By being involved in weekly planning, she did a lot of behind-the-scenes work and follow-up for all kinds of events CP offered.

In fact, we all would have swallowed up Cindy's many areas of giftedness long-term--were it not for the larger realities of her life that compelled her to step down from that part-time minister role after a season. As her parallel success at her job increased (Cindy's been a longtime lead editor at Carolina Biological), Cindy felt increasingly pulled. Finally, as her mother aged into a stage requiring more help, Cindy often made full-weekend trips, and she needed to carve out more personal space. She gave our church ample warning, and transitioned back to being a

normal but still fairly involved CP church member. We recognized her outrageously generous gifts of ministry when she closed that chapter back in 2015, but that stint as a part-time minister bears rehearsing again in the context of this award. Her service to CP shouldn't be reduced to being merely all about that last role she took on, but it certainly was a culmination of what Cindy does best: offer as *much* of herself as she possibly can in service of the church. She is so guietly wholehearted in whatever she takes on; it's frankly awe-inspiring to me. This award ends up being truly just a drop in the bucket in terms of acknowledging and thanking you, Cindy, for the hours upon hours you have poured out of yourself. The Baptist ideal of "every member a minister" finds fullest expression in individuals like you who tackle that commitment with every fiber of their being. Thank you, Cindy. Words can hardly do justice.
