We heard God whenever we were deaf to unkindness but alert for words of love and understanding.


We smelled God whenever we breathed in the freshness of the morning and felt gratitude fill our hearts as clean air filled our lungs.

Ephesians 2.13-22 The Message (MSG)

But don't take any of this for granted. It was only yesterday that you outsiders to God's ways had no idea of any of this, didn't know the first thing about the way God works, hadn't the faintest idea of Christ. You knew nothing of that rich history of God's covenants and promises in Israel, hadn't a clue about what God was doing in the world at large. Now because of Christ—dying that death, shedding that blood you who were once out of it altogether are in on everything. The Messiah has made things up between us so that we're now together on this, both non-Jewish outsiders and Jewish insiders. He tore down the wall we used to keep each other at a distance. He repealed the law code that had become so clogged with fine print and footnotes that it hindered more than it helped. Then he started over. Instead of continuing with two groups of people separated by centuries of animosity and suspicion, he created a new kind of human being, a fresh start for everybody. Christ brought us together through his death on the cross. The Cross got us to embrace, and that was the end of the hostility. Christ came and preached peace to you outsiders and peace to us insiders. He treated us as equals, and so made us equals. Through him we both share the same Spirit and have equal access to the Father. That's plain enough, isn't it? You're no longer wandering exiles. This kingdom of faith is now your home country. You're no longer strangers or outsiders. You belong here, with as much right to the name Christian as anyone. God is building a home. He's using us all irrespective of how we got here—in what he is building. He used the apostles and prophets for the foundation. Now he's using you, fitting you in brick by brick, stone by stone, with Christ Jesus as the cornerstone that holds all the parts together. We see it taking shape day after day—a holy temple built by God, all of us built into it, a temple in which God is guite at home.



Frank was born in Raleigh but grew up in Lumberton. He attended Wake Forest for college and Duke for graduate school. Before retiring three years ago, he was the minister of New Creation Community Presbyterian Church - an alternative church model based on Church of the Savior in Washington, DC. At the time of retirement, he was working for New Creation as well as serving as the head chaplain at Greensboro Urban Ministry where he trained chaplains from Duke and Wake Forest Divinity schools. He also was the chaplain for Habitat and taught courses on urban ministry at Wake Forest Divinity School. Since retirement, he is the Peace and Justice Advocate staff member for Salem Presbytery and continues serving as chaplain for Habitat for Humanity of Greater Greensboro and serving on national hunger committees for the Presbyterian Church. He also continues to teach courses occasionally at Wake Forest Divinity School and currently, at Church of the Savior in Washington, DC.

Mao's Last Dancer is a 2009 Australian film based on professional dancer Li Cunxin's autobiography of the same name. The film chronicles the journey of Li and the struggle for his artistic soul from the day when, as an 11-year-old boy, he is plucked from a remote provincial town and sent to train in Beijing. Everything he knows is challenged when he is chosen to attend a ballet summer program in Houston, Texas. The film won the Audience Award at the 2009 Sao Paulo International Film Festival, and six awards from the 2009 Australian Film Institute.
